Robinson Crusoe (/ ˈ k r uː s oʊ /) is a novel by Daniel Defoe, first published on 25 April 1719. The first edition credited the work's protagonist Robinson Crusoe as its author, leading many readers to believe he was a real person and the book a travelogue of true incidents. Robinson Crusoe had two brothers. One brother died, and the other one disappeared. Crusoe lived in England and since he didn't know how to do anything his father asked him to work as a salesman and so inherit half of his lifework. Crusoe wanted to be a sailor. His parents tried to talk him out of it but didn't succeed. Robinson Crusoe (1719) by Daniel Defoe is the story of a young Englishman that takes to the seas and is shipwrecked on a tropical island for 28 years. Featuring beautiful illustrations by N.C. Wyeth. The story of Robinson Crusoe is pretty famous, but few people know about, let alone read, the two sequels to the book which Defoe wrote: The Farther Adventures of Robinson Crusoe followed later in the same year, with Serious Reflections of Robinson Crusoe following a year later in 1720.
